

Letter from the ISCA President ...

As most of you know from my letter last week, LP is using deception to start their own Sunfish Class, ISCO. This was done in retaliation because the World Council would not sign over our rights to the ISCA initials and the name International Sunfish Class Association in a restrictive trademark agreement to LP. At our World Council meeting held in Brant Beach on August 30, 2017, we voted that we would not relinquish our rights to ISCA at any cost. Enough was enough.

The class is tired of being held hostage to LP. From threatening to withhold World Championship boat shipments, unless we signed the agreement, to not being able to get class legal parts for many years, created the need for the World Council to take action. The World Council has changed the class rules to allow ISCA, not the builder, to approve class legal parts for the boats. These rule changes have been submitted to World Sailing, and they have assured ISCA that they are working to approve this ASAP. Unfortunately, LP has left the Class with more problems than solutions, broken promises and few choices. It would be ideal if LP could just support the class make boats, and let us sail them.

Recently LP has notified many of you to sign an agreement with them. We caution you ... DO NOT SIGN ANYTHING from LP, Velum or ISCO! Beware; LP has many different layered companies. Although the letter stated it was signed by ISCA, it was not! ISCA had nothing to do with the letter. All of ISCA's letters will originate from the Class office.



This agreement is being done to benefit LP, not one-design sailing for our Class. Once again LP offers nothing. Where is their plan for charter boats? Since 2011 ISCA has to find a dealer to layout all of the money for the World Championship Charters. With all of the problems over the years this has become an increasingly difficult sell to dealers. Therefore, the 2018 ISCA World Championships will be a bring your own boat Regatta. (see NOR link below)

This Class belongs to the members and not LP. Make no mistake about it, ISCO is LP and LP is ISCO. In order for ISCA to become a recognized Class by World sailing (ISAF) in 1984, the Class had to be independent from the builder for a year before being recognized. AMF spun the Class off to be an independent internationally recognized Class and now LP wants it back. The one caveat is that they want ISCA members to run it under their control.

Here is an update on the actions we are taking. We will do our best to keep all of you updated on a regular basis as things develop. We continue to fight for our Class and will not give up.

- Our attorney issued LP a "cease and desist" letter telling them to stop using any information copied from our website. That includes our, Class Rules, Constitution, mission statement and personal information of our members. This is a clear copyright violation. The outrage expressed by many of you directly to LP has been a huge help. Thank you for your support.
- The update from Hector Duval, our ISCA World Sailing representative who met with World Sailing at their annual meeting in Mexico last week, is quite encouraging. Please note that World Sailing has not made any public statements of support yet, but we feel it's important that you know what is currently happening there.
 - a. The general consensus of the World Sailing members, who Hector talked with, do not support ISCO's and LP's actions. World Sailing is run for the sailors not for the builders. World Sailing is very familiar with LP and their issues and, as a result, World Sailing currently supports ISCA not ISCO.
 - The consensus for approving our class rule change, giving us the right to approve class legal parts, is positive. It has even been hinted at that we should expect an approval letter quite soon.

Again, we await a public statement of support from World Sailing's within the next week. We all know we are not alone in our fight for independence. The International Laser Class Association (ILCA) has also had similar issues. LP has not been supporting our Class since 2011, but they are intent on starving us for parts and controlling us. Once World Sailing acts we will know what our next steps will be.

What we do predict is that LP will continue their fight to try to take control of our class. LP hopes to win by depleting the class's funds. Now more than ever, it is crucial that everyone renews their membership and supports the class with donations. We did not choose this fight, LP did. Donations will help with our legal expenses and with keeping the class independent. So you'll be hearing more from us about ways you can help.

Lastly, I want to thank Hector Duval for all his efforts at the World Sailing Annual meeting in Mexico last week. Hector was very busy and was able to get meetings on short notice with World Sailing's key personnel. Hector, I know I'm speaking for our entire class; THANK YOU for all of your hard work this week. We would not have been able to move as quickly as we did without your help." It is important to note that we are all volunteers, and Hector was at the World Sailing meeting on his own nickel. We did not pay his way; he does this because he loves this class like we all do!

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ISCA World Council Annual Meeting

Brant Beach Yacht Club, Brant Beach, NJ, USA Wednesday, August 30, 2017 – 6:30 p.m.

Minutes of the Previous Meeting – A motion was made to accept the previous Minutes as presented, seconded; approval was unanimous.

ISCA President Report/Larry Mass – Everyone should have a copy of the Trademark ™ Agreement and Support outline. This is probably the most important issue to be discussed later in this meeting. We continue to struggle with boats/parts/equipment. ISCA has spent some money this year in legal fees to work out a mutually beneficial Trademark ™ Agreement with Laser Performance (LP). Without approval of the Trademark ™ Agreement, the new Support outline will not be signed and is completely independent from the Trademark Agreement. The ISCA World Council was ready to sign the Trademark ™ Agreement several months ago until a revised version from LP added that the ISCA name would become the property of LP. This was deemed an unacceptable change by the World Council. As you can imagine, this issue has consumed most of ISCA's time this past year as well as the previous year. As a result, we hired a Trademark ™ attorney who specializes in maritime trademark issues to help us navigate through the legalities of an agreement.

The 1992 Support Agreement is still in place until 31 August 2017. However, ISCA was to get \$5 per manufactured boat and LP was supposed to supply charters for \$250 (not having ISCA find a dealer to buy and supply boats) and pay ISCA's World Sailing (formerly ISAF) annual fee. This ceased several years ago around the time LP took over. The current 1984 World Sailing Agreement has an arbitration clause in which any disputes would be settled by arbitration first. If we cannot work out a suitable agreement, then we may be headed to arbitration. World Sailing would like to have an updated agreement with ISCA and LP. A current construction manual would be part of this agreement, and we are in the process of trying to help with getting an updated manual published.

After much discussion at an Executive Session with only voting members at the end of the World Council meeting, a motion was made to sign the Trademark ™ Agreement with the elimination of the clause stating the ISCA name would be given to LP and changing the fact that ISCA can now change/approve Class legal parts and equipment. The motion was seconded and approved.

ISCA Vice President Report/Willo Cappelleti of Peru – Willo sends his regrets that he was not able to attend this World Council meeting and wishes us all well.

ISCA Treasurer Report/Sonya Dean – We are doing what we can with our budget, but are running the Class very thin. Unexpected legal fees and basic expenses such as our Class office salary, general office expenses, advertisement, World Sailing fees, subscriptions and our website consume what we have coming in as income. The bottom line is we need to increase membership to increase our income.

Chief Measurer Report/Rob Eberle – Most important is to maintain the ONE DESIGN quality of our Class. It was suggested that we make available measuring jigs to those events hosting regattas that our Chief Measurer cannot attend. Best idea to help make this happen: approach a few manufacturers to produce new jigs at cost (daggerboard and rudder jigs). Dovetailed into this idea, there's been a request to have more than just Rob to help with measuring, and Rob said he is more than willing to help train anyone to do the measuring and is always available via phone/Skype/etc.

Challenges to the rules was the next issue discussed. Rob said to give any/all challenges to him which eventually get presented to the World Council for a vote. The challenge discussed at this meeting involved the stainless-steel reinforced bullet block (pad-eye) on the deck for the halyard. The four Sunfish dealers Rob talked with about this said that a stainless-steel pad-

and approve that sail as Class legal. Jaime Torres translated to Spanish Chris Williams' Advisory Council Minutes stating how this Class rule change will be rewritten into our current By-Laws. A motion was made to approve the motion that the By-Laws will state that ISCA can approve any equipment changes. We will no longer be limited to equipment "as supplied by the builder" if that equipment doesn't meet our standards or can be improved with a similar item that is stronger and longer-lasting or more in keeping with maintaining our ONE DESIGN status. The motion was seconded and approved.

- (3) Suspend Rule 42 during major world-qualifying events was proposed; no interest. Item was tabled.
- (4) New rudder with different rudder hole so that rudder can be placed vertical to the hull instead of at an angle; Larry Suter provided an example of a rudder with one hole re-drilled to accommodate moving the cheek plate so that the rudder sits vertical to the hull instead of at an angle (demonstrated by PJ at the Advisory Council meeting). This proposed change was defeated in previous years due to the additional expense. By re-drilling one hole, the rudder can be modified so that the tiller straps go thru the pivot hole; no extra expense is involved except for the extra labor to re-drill a hole and move the cheek plate. (Eduardo translated this explanation in Spanish.) No vote was needed to permit this rudder change to be used in **non-qualifying World Qualifying** events to get feedback in a one-year experiment. Anyone wishing to participate in this experiment is welcome to do so and provide feedback as to whether this change was helpful or not and under what wind conditions. It was decided we will put a template on the website for those who want to drill a new hole in their rudder to experiment with this new vertical rudder placement.

The discussion of end-caps ensued. It was decided that Aqua-Finn End-Caps don't have enough depth and don't work as well as Opti End-caps which are deeper and heavier. Larry Mass told LP that Opti end-caps are an even better part to replace the original Sunfish end-cap. The Opti end-caps were used on the new boats provided for the 2017 Sunfish Worlds.

Everyone applauded Chris Williams for his 10+ yrs of exemplary service on the Advisory Council.

Membership Report/Paul Welles – Worldwide we have 1,074 members. But our membership numbers are trending downward. The Pan Am Games will help membership increase in 2018, however. We all need to spread our "LOVE" for the Class to those at our Clubs. Someone suggested we need to offer incentives – e.g., a printed *Windward Leg*. Funds to print a *Windward Leg* are the only reason we don't send out a printed version, however. At US Sailing, they offer a discounted membership fee with their Golden Anchor program. Perhaps we should think about doing something similar. All suggestions are welcome.

IMPORTANT: Jim Koehler suggested that for the new Sunfish Youth Foundation program, youth sailors eligible for support from SYF funds must be a member of a local Sunfish Fleet. This idea was already implemented into the approval process.

Someone else suggested that we sponsor more "sanctioned" events which require joining the Class. Stewart Draheim of Dallas, TX, pointed out that one problem is that younger sailors perceive the Sunfish as a non-competitive Class. To change that perception, we need to spread the word that our Sunfish champions are incredible athletes and sponsor events that promote this high level of championship status. Team racing, for example, could be one way to promote an event that gains the attention of a younger audience. Great idea. In general, we need to work on getting the average age of Class members down. To do this we can create some PR and marketing material to show the Sunfish as a championship boat sailed by incredible athletes who also compete in other boats as well.

World Sailing Report/Larry Mass – We need a new Agreement with World Sailing which is in the works.

Election of Advisory Council Officers — The members nominated, approved and listed here will serve on the Advisory Council for the next 2 yrs. Jim Koehler & Paul Welles/USA, Guy De Chavigny/Martinique, Willo Cappelleti & Alex Zimmerman/Peru, Jaime Torres/Puerto Rico, Martin Alsogaray (Argentina) & Juan Mazzini/Argentina, John Birkett (ECU), Jurgen Schneider (CUR) — A motion to approve all nominees was made, seconded and approved. The Advisory Council Chairperson will be Jim Koehler/USA. Jim and Paul Welles were nominated to be Chairperson, but Paul said he just can't take on that level of responsibility at this time.

Jorge Barreda (PASAF)—Jorge started sailing Sunfish in the 1970's. Since then he has remained one of our strongest supporters by participating as an International Judge at our World events and on the Committee that approves boats for the Pan Am Games. This Pan Am Games Committee meets every 4 years to select boats to be used. The Sunfish was ratified at the last meeting thanks to Cocoa's ingenious proposal of asking for a "non-confidence" vote if the Sunfish was not approved by committee members. The next Pan Am Games will be Paracas, Peru, a heavy air venue which is a high qualifier for locations of Pan Am Games. There will be 3 race courses with fleets alternating to different race courses. All races will start at 1 p.m. when the wind usually comes in. One hotel will be official hotel for this event. Peru has the largest Sunfish fleet outside the USA.

Pan Am Games Country qualifiers will be: the Sunfish South Americans & Caribbean Championship to be held in Cartagena (Apr 30-May 2, 2018); Midwinters & International Masters in Panama City, FL (Mar. 18-24, 2018); the Sunfish North American Championship at Lake Bluff Yacht Club, Waukegan, IL (8/1-4, 2018) and the 2019 Sunfish South American & Caribbean

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Championship in Peru, January 2019 (Host TBD). The Sunfish South Americans & Caribbean Championship scheduled in Puerto Rico (Nov. 28-Dec. 2, 2017) was canceled due to the damage caused by Hurricane Maria in late September 2017. We need to work hard to remain a qualified Pan Am Games boat.

Update on Future World Championships/Larry Mass – 2018 Worlds at Wrightsville Beach, NC – two organizers were here in Brant Beach to see what was done. In Wrightsville waters, there are no obstructions; no shallow waters; waters warm in October and good breezes. They are working on housing. Some meals will be provided. Everything is on track. But will it be a bring-your-own-boat Worlds? Or will LP supply boats? We don't know yet. Paul Welles is willing to be the dealer if LP will provide boats.

2019 Bonaire Worlds – no updates; boats will be a challenge. Bonaire wants to schedule the event in June. As a result, the 2018 and 2019 Worlds may be less than a year apart. This is something to keep in mind when planning.

2020 Worlds/Martinique – Guy De Chavigny said they are looking at June 15 because wind conditions are better then and there are only direct flights to Martinique in the summer season.

Honorary Life Membership Nomination/Larry Mass – Larry Mass nominated Connie Miller for a Life Membership – A motion was made; seconded and approved unanimously VERY QUICKLY!!! No one had to think hard about honoring Connie's achievements within the Sunfish Class ... racing in every North Americans except for Dallas in 2015; hosting major events at the last minute when another Club has bowed out; finding housing for almost every competitor; providing transportation to and from the airport for youth sailors; providing wonderful meals for all sailors (even after the event!) – and the list goes on and on. We are a better Class – a special "family" – because of members like Connie. We couldn't think of anyone who deserved this honor of a Life Membership more. Congratulations!

A motion was made to adjourn this regular World Council meeting.

2017 Advisory Council Meeting Annual Meeting Minutes

Brant Beach Yacht Club – Brant Beach, NJ, USA Aug. 28, 2017 – 6:30 p.m.

- I. A motion was made and seconded to approve the Minutes of the previous meeting.
- II. Proposed Changes to the Rules:

The following rules changes were approved:

- 1) Permit replacement of halyard bullseye with one of similar dimensions that has a metal sleeve.
- 2) Modify the following sections of the Class Rules:
 - "No addition or alteration may be made to the Sunfish as supplied by the Builder except as is specifically authorized by these rules."

Current Rule 1.1: Unless specifically prohibited, any equipment that has ever been supplied by the Builder may be used on any boat.

Updated 1.1: "All equipment, including the hull, and sails, must be approved by the International Sunfish Class Association. This may include 3rd party parts."

Note to the World Council -the words that refer to "the builder" in the Class Rules will be changed to: ISCA

III. Old Business: None

IV. New Business:

- 1) Puerto Rico requested ISCA makes fixtures available for measurement. The Advisory Council recommends that "ISCA will make approved fixtures for measurement. The NSCAs can purchase them from ISCA."
- 2) There was a brief discussion of changing Class Rules to suspend RRS 42 in more than 10 knots of wind. There was no interest by the Advisory Council in this change.
- 3) Rudder test. Permit a one-year test of the ability to make a rudder more vertical by drilling one new hole (sample drawing and instructions to make changes will be published on website). This would only be legal in events that are not worlds qualifiers. Advisory Council will assess feedback in one year.

V. A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting.

Second Wind by Nathaniel Philbrick USSCA North American Champion in 1978

"There had been something elemental and all-consuming about a Sunfish. Nothing could compare to the exhilaration of a close race in a real blow—the wind howling and spray flying as my Sunfish and I punched through the waves to the finish." (Excerpt from Second Wind)

In the spring of 1992, Nat Philbrick was in his late thirties, living with his family on Nantucket, feeling stranded and

In the spring of 1992, Nat Philbrick was in his late thirties, living with his family on Nantucket, feeling stranded and longing for that thrill of victory he once felt after winning a national sailing championship in his youth. Was it a midlife crisis? It was certainly a watershed for the journalist-turned-stay-at-home dad, who impulsively decided to throw his hat into the ring, or water, again.

With the bemused approval of his wife and children, Philbrick used the off-season on the island as his solitary training ground, sailing his tiny Sunfish to its remotest corners, experiencing the haunting beauty of its tidal creeks, inlets, and wave-battered sandbars. On ponds, bays, rivers, and finally at the championship on a lake in the heartland of America, he sailed through storms and memories, racing for the prize, but finding something unexpected about himself instead.

Nathaniel Philbrick (aka Nat to us Sunfish sailors who have watched his transom cross the finish line far ahead of

Opinion from a voracious reader (that would be me! vep), Nat has a way with words that will keep you captured from page 1 to the end no matter what the subject. Books about history - normally not on my list of favorite reading subjects ... until I read every one of Nat's books, however! His words grab you and won't let go! His knowledge of the events give you a more accurate depiction and sometimes different perspective than what you learned in school. You get smarter while being blown away with some of the best writing style you've been exposed to in a long, long time.

Second Wind, his first novel which was published in hard cover, was of special interest to me because I'm mentioned along with Lee Parks and Pat Manning as having done some sightseeing in Springfield, Illinois, with Nat while bombing around in Lee's "mean green machine" at the 1993 USSCA North American Championship. What a fun experience!

2017 ISCA World Championship — Brant Beach Yacht Club

Angello Giuria of Peru Wins the Youth Championship — August 23-26 Alonso Collantes of Peru Holds onto the #1 Top Spot for the 2nd Year — August 27-Sept. 1

Brant Beach, NJ ... Siri, are you sure heading SE on Hwy 72 in NJ from the Philadelphia Airport will lead to an island called Long Beach? Really? There's an island off New Jersey? And a town called Brant Beach on this island? You were right on, Siri! And what a beautiful place it was! Add another benefit to attending an ISCA World Championship! Visiting new places, seeing long-time Sunfish friends and making new friends!

The Brant Beach Yacht Club was an awesome venue for Sunfish racing – a Club and its members who so warmly welcomed everyone. Excellent food, lots to drink (with warm temperatures this was so appreciated), beautiful yacht club, a super well-organized event, generous hosts/hostesses and awesome Race Committee work. Then there were the fun places to visit, excellent restaurants to try and a beautiful beach to walk along. And, of course, let's not forget the nice places to shop.

The 2017 ISCA World Youth Champion for the second year in a row, Angello Giuria of Peru, made all the right moves to earn this top spot once again sailing in a fleet of 21 competitors from 7 different countries. But not without other youth champions-to-be also



sailing smart and fast enjoying the challenge to see who could outpace Angello. The second place finisher was Ignacio Antequera Erro of Spain who earned two bullets in the 9 races; one OCS was his throwout. In 3rd place was Clemente Sequel of Chile whose Dad was there to cheer him on. Clemente had a bullet in Race 6. Alejandro Mago of Peru whose steady finishes somewhere in the top 5 for 7 of the 9 races handily earned him the 4th place overall. And finishing in 5th place with a bullet in Race 5 to her credit was Miranda Paz of Peru, the Top Female, followed by Adrianna Barron of Peru in 6th place who scored a bullet in Race 7. Colombian Youth Sailor, Simon Gomez, finished in 7th place and had some incredible starts that helped him earn two 1st place finishes. According to Simon's Dad, Ariel Gomez, Simon teaches sailing for free to a group of kids (sons of farmers) near where he lives in Colombia. Mr. Gomez also said Simon gives them boats, equipment and a lot of respect and love. I bet there's more to these champions than we see on the race course. I'm so glad Mr. Gomez shared this wonderful story with us . If any Sunfish sailor you know has "another life" so-to-speak, send your stories to the Editor of the Windward Leg!

Santiago Canziani of Peru finished in 8th place and scored a top place finish in Race 9. Ernesto Sarrazin of Ecuador placed 9th. And Michael Andres Velez Soledispa of Ecuador was the 10th place finisher. Champions ... ALL!

And then there's Alonso Collantes of Peru who captured the numero uno spot at the ISCA World Championship for the second year in a row. And a Champion he will always be to the people who know him! Let me share my Alonso "story" before I continue with the other top finishers. Standing at the bulletin board after Day Three's races anxiously awaiting the results to be posted, Alonso seemed a little nervous and very determined to see where Day's Three results would place him. He hadn't been the #1 finisher after Day's One and Two so he seemed concerned. Well, getting four bullets on Day Three moved him up to 1st place, and the relief on his face was like watching the sun come out after a cloudy day! There's no doubt Alonso is pure champion through and through!

Speaking of "champions," Eugene Schmitt of New Orleans did his best to shoot for the top spot but, alas, Alonso just couldn't be beat. But to finish in 2nd place in this championship fleet of 54 competitors from 10 different countries ... WOW, impressive! Eugene won the Sunfish Midwinters in Florida earlier in the year and placed 5th out of a fleet of 64 competitors at this year's North Americans held at the Sayville Yacht Club. So he's been practicing, and he's getting harder and harder to beat! In 3rd place was Edgar Diminich of Ecuador who got a bullet in Race 11. Finishing 4th was Clemente Sequel of Chile, who scored two bullets in this impressive fleet. But his aggressiveness at the start line for two races caused two OCS scores to ruin the final tally. David Hernandez of Guatemala was the 5th place finisher with Jonathan Martinetti of Ecuador finishing in 6th place. Jean Paul de Trazegnies of Peru finished in 7th place, a young man who never fails to come by and say hello when he arrives at a regatta. Both Jean Paul and Alonso actually hung out on the PRO boat in between a couple of races just chatting away with all of us. What a pleasure that was! I told Paul Coward, the PRO, that he should feel quite privileged that these exceptional young men would even want to hang out with a bunch of "older" people on a committee boat. Paul's comment was, "That's because I didn't kick them off!" Oh, right. That's not true at all. Both Paul (the Championship PRO) and Bub Kovacs (the Youth Championship PRO) were two of the most competent and most entertaining PRO's I've had the pleasure of doing Race Committee with. 

But most of all it's about spending time with our Sunfish "family" ... Seeing Nicholas Reyes share his ISCA Worlds experience with his Dad there watching. Hearing the laughter and typical "Dad" things between Paul-Jon Patin and son Nicholas who have become a traveling team. Watching Rob Eberle score a 3rd place finish in one of the races. Having dinner at a lovely restaurant with Gail Murphy-Heausler, Lee Parks, Tom Katterheinrich and getting to meet Chris Houston with his wife Lesley for the first time. Watching a group of South American Youth competitors from different countries share a table, laughing and kibitzing about what tactic on the race course worked and didn't work. Or maybe talking about girls? No! Walking to the Club each morning seeing the seagulls dive for their breakfast and hearing the waves hit the shore; we don't get a lot of that in Tucson.

Grab Some Friends and Go!

It's 3:30 on Friday afternoon and 4 Sunfish sailors are the Lake Bluff Yacht Club beach securing the final boat to the top of the pickup. Attached to the back of the black Silverado is an A-frame trailer holding the three other Sunfish that will be towed to Devil's Lake Yacht Club to compete in the first Midwest Regional Championship. Devil's Lake is a beautiful lake in south central Michigan that is housed in a grand building from the 1870's that was once a hotel for vacationers. Day 2 began with light winds that were forecast to build and the sailors were not disappointed. The wind gods provided 8-10 knot breezes and some nice ocsilations for all three races. The new conditions gave

some of the sailors who struggled on day one a chance to get back into the game. Local sailor Dan Norton had a strong showing winning race 4 and placing 2nd in race 6.
