GROWING THE FLEET: WHY HAVE A JAM SECTION?

This is a test. Select the best answer for why your Club has a Jib and Main (JAM) section: 1) For beginners only; 2) For shorthanded skippers; 3) For cruising boats; 4) For skippers with older racing/cruising boats; 5) None of the above; 6) All of the above.



If you selected #1, you picked the reason why most JAM fleets started many years ago. JAM provided a section where beginners got to try all the unique activities that make racing so much fun, like starts, mark roundings, sailing in all kinds of weather, navigation, and of course, a round of beer at the Club post-race. But the times they have been a-changing, and today, the best JAM programs are much more than just for beginners.

Answer #2 is another good reason to sail in JAM, because a seasoned crew hasn't yet been developed, or the skipper decides to sail shorthanded. These aren't bad reasons to be in JAM, but there are other better reasons. So like answer #1, this isn't correct for our quiz.

Giving cruising boat sailors the very special experiences racers enjoy is an excellent reason for a JAM section. Cruising is so much different than racing that even experienced skippers have plenty to learn by getting out on the race course frequently. Although a good answer, like the first two, the best JAM sections usually have more than just pure cruising boats. So #3 is also not correct.

Older sailboats are essentially different than newer boats. This divide has been evident since the advent of production fiberglass boats over fifty years ago. That difference remains wide today, not only because of variances in the predicted performance of older versus newer boats in different wind and water conditions, but also because of budget requirements and crew expertise.

For example, a brand new 29 foot J/88 will cost about \$150K to bring to the starting line, while an older used C&C 33 can be racing for \$20K. The C&C with its simple masthead rig is a breeze to operate in JAM (pun intended) with very few sail changes required. But the J/88, beyond the budget issues, needs a well trained crew to hoist and douse those giant asymmetrical



spinnakers in all kinds of weather. Both types of boats require knowledgeable skippers and talented crew to win in JAM for the older C&C 33 or in Spinnaker for the state-of-the-art J/88.

This reason #4 provides an important motivation for your Club to have a JAM section. Competitive JAM racing opens up a whole new arena for skippers who don't have a newer boat, a bigger budget, or access to a wide selection of expert crew trained through years of competition.

We can now eliminate #5, as "None of the above" makes no sense given the good choices already noted. This brings us to the right answer, "All of the above." But wait, how can beginners race against boats with experienced skippers and crew? How can short-handed boats keep up? Will cruising boats find a home is a section with all this racing going on?

The answers are a resounding yes, if you follow just a few rules. The first is that any boat is welcome in JAM as long as it is 25-30 years old, and is not built with a carbon fiber mast, bow sprit, or exotic hull laminates. If it is a true cruising boat, it can be of any vintage. You can have as many or few crew as you like onboard, no restrictions. Single handers are welcome as long as they sail an older racing/cruising or true cruising boat.

These boat requirements follow from the analysis prepared by Bruce Bingman, Chair of the US PHRF Committee. He finds the fairest racing takes place when similar-type boats race against each other. In thinking about rating spreads, he suggests placing similar boats in the same section, even if the rating spread is wide. Bruce's in-depth three part series on how best to configure PHRF racing sections reviewed the data behind his conclusions and can be found in Scuttlebutt Sailing News, April 4-6, 2017.

So what about beginners? We welcome new racers in our JAM section as they are some of our most consistent participants. Of course, they don't expect to win and most don't, but we've discovered that's fine. How can they have fun in a section with better skippers as well? Our newer racers actually aren't offended by having good sailors in JAM. After all, how else does anyone learn? The beginners watch the seasoned hands at the start, take cues from them on the course, and observe how they stay out of trouble. The same is true of skippers with cruising boats and those sailing shorthanded.



In fact, with a few good racers at the top of your JAM fleet you'll likely attract others with older boats bringing in more competition. Last year in St. Joseph (Michigan) we had two older spinnaker boats drop into JAM and win races. Both skippers were skilled and transferred into JAM to be able to race, rather than being stuck with an old boat in our Spinnaker section filled with newer, lighter, faster boats.

Although left in the dust by the hot hardware in our Spinnaker section, older Spinnaker section boats find it tougher in JAM than they thought but still possible to do well. A few years ago, a very fast recent Mac-winner and prior SJRYC Spinnaker Boat of the Year dropped into JAM for the second half of the summer. They sailed their older boat fast and absolutely knew what they were doing. But they didn't dominate, ending up in second place for the series, having won just a few races.

Nobody's mad when this happens. The top skippers in JAM like the competition as it gives them a chance to up their game. The beginners and cruisers enjoy a bigger group of boats with more good sailors to learn from.

By developing a section with older racer-cruisers along with pure cruising boats, PHRF ratings work quite well, even with fairly wide section spreads. Last year, one of the smallest boats in our JAM section won our Summer Series soundly beating all the bigger "faster" boats. JAM Boat of the Year for 2017 was decided between three top boats and hinged on the outcome of a single race. If the winner had lost one place at any point in the season to either of the runner-ups, we'd have had a different BotY in JAM in 2017. It can't get much closer than that.

JAM Boat of the Year finishes in St. Joe weren't close just in 2017. They have been amazingly close for the last seven years, with plenty of competition and in many cases tighter finishes than in our heavily weaponized Spinnaker section. We believe the more competition the better, so we all get the chance to become better sailors.



The outcome we've seen has been both more boats racing and better competition. We think those goals are the right ones and speak directly to the reasons why a growing, vibrant, competitive JAM section exists in our race program.

By setting up your JAM section this way you'll make a home for all those skippers on a budget looking for the chance to race their older boats competitively against other similar craft. Without this approach, most of our current JAM fleet would be forced to sit on the sidelines. Develop a JAM section like this at your Club and you might be surprised how your fleet will expand, bringing better competition as well.

BOATERS STAND TO GAIN WITH GOVERNMENT'S RECOGNITION OF OUTDOOR INDUSTRY

It's no surprise that the industries that produce the most goods or services and keep the economy humming often receive favorable attention from legislators in Washington. Now with the Department of Commerce's Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) February announcement that the outdoor recreation industry's 2016 annual gross output is 2 percent (\$373.7 billion) of the US gross domestic product (GDP), Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS) believes boaters stand to gain from the news.

"Having a strong industry behind you is important when working in the halls of government," said BoatUS Manager of Government Affairs David Kennedy. "It can ultimately influence legislation that makes boating better, such as improving boating access by funding new launch ramps, providing budgets to maintain boating infrastructure or navigation aids, improving fishing habitat, and helping support boating safety efforts."

The analysis was a result of passage of the Outdoor Recreation Jobs and Economic Impact Act of 2016, which required the Department of Commerce, acting through the BEA, to enter into a joint memorandum with the Department of Agriculture and the Department of the Interior to conduct, assess and analyze the outdoor recreation economy of the United States and its effects on the overall US economy.

The outdoor industry grew 3.8 percent in 2016, compared to 2.8 percent for the overall economy. Boating and fishing activities totaled \$38.2 billion, an increase of 4 percent over 2015. The BEA report also noted that the outdoor recreation industry, which



includes boating, fishing, RVing, hunting, camping, hiking, bicycling and supporting activities, surpassed the US agriculture and petroleum industries.

BoatUS remains part of a coalition of outdoor groups, organizations and businesses under the Outdoor Recreation Roundtable that urged the federal government to recognize the industry's economic importance. The "prototype" statistics covering 2012 to 2016 from the newly established Department of Commerce Outdoor Recreation Satellite Account allow the public to comment before the BEA releases the final statistics this fall. The Outdoor Recreation Roundtable advocates for bipartisan support for improved access to public lands and waters, increasing public-private partnerships to help modernize infrastructure and reduce decades-old maintenance backlogs that can provide a better visitor experience, support for responsible conservation efforts, and growth of outdoor recreation participation.

HOW TO GET A BOAT LOAN WITHOUT A HICCUP

With interest rates already on the rise, how can you ensure your boat loan goes smoothly without time-consuming hiccups? Here are 10 tips from Boat Owners Association of The United States just in time for the spring buying season.

1. Check your credit. Before applying for a loan get your current credit score and ensure your credit report is accurate. Scores above 800 may earn you a better interest rate. A free copy of your credit report is available annually from each of the three national credit bureaus at <u>www.AnnualCreditReport.com</u>. You can also check with your credit card issuer or bank you do business with. Other options are a credit counselor, a fee-based service, or to purchase it from the credit bureau. Find more at the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau.

2. Find the right loan type. A fixed-rate, fixed-term, simple-interest loan is the most common. This offers the same monthly payment for the life of the loan. Variable rate or hybrid options may offer a combination of a fixed rate for a few years, and then a variable rate. With interest rates forecasted to continue to rise in 2018, the appeal of variable rate loans may decrease. Don't forget to ask if there are prepayment penalties for paying off the loan early.

3. Consider a HELOC. Buyers of smaller vessels often tap into their home equity line of credit (HELOC) to fund a boat purchase. That may work well if you plan to pay the boat off while interest rates remain relatively low. However, passage of the Tax Cut and Jobs Act of 2017 eliminated the deductibility on interest for a home equity loan (if the qualifying vessel has a sleeping berth, cooking and toilet facilities).

4. Compare loan rates. Generally rates are lower and available loan terms are longer for newer boats and larger loan amounts. However, each is dependent on a variety of factors including model year, loan amount and down payment. Be prepared for banks to require larger down payments, have higher rates and offer shorter terms on older boats, especially those more than 20 model years. There could also be a significant rate difference between some consecutive model years, so be sure to talk with your lender and understand their rate and term structure.

5. Don't be fooled by ads. You may see rates advertised as low as 3.99 percent, but there usually will be some small print that could make that loan less attractive. For instance, the rate might only be fixed for a few years or the loan period might be only seven years.

6. Get pre-approved. To help save time, ask if you can get preapproval, or if you can possibly start the underwriting process before you have a signed sales agreement or even have a specific boat in mind.

7. Know your tax benefits. A boat can qualify as a second-home loan interest deduction if it has a berth, galley and head, so buying a boat with these features may offer a tax advantage. However, the new Tax Cut and Jobs Act of 2017 reduces the previous \$1 million second-home mortgage deduction limit to \$750,000 and completely eliminates deductibility of interest for a home equity loan that's often favored by small boat buyers to fund a purchase.

8. Get it surveyed. For pre-owned vessels, hire a qualified marine surveyor to inspect the boat to ensure it is in good condition and you won't have any unexpected repair bills. BoatUS.com/Surveyors can help you find one. Also, many lenders will require a marine survey.



9. Ask about closing costs. As with any loan, there are some fees involved. Sales tax, processing fees, title and registration and/or US Coast Guard documentation fees are common. Check with your lender to find out what to expect.

10. Calculate your monthly payment. How much can you afford? Go to BoatUS.com/Calculator to easily crunch the numbers. Your lender will also review your debt ratio and other criteria.

TowBoatUS OPENS NEW LOCATIONS IN RACINE AND WAUKEGAN

Captain Gareth "Gary" Stamm, a recreational boat-towing captain and business owner, opened his second TowBoatUS location on the Illinois River last year. Now Stamm is seeing growth potential on Lake Michigan with the opening of TowBoatUS Racine and TowBoatUS Waukegan. The two new locations, which span the Illinois–Wisconsin border, replace TowBoatUS Kenosha, essentially doubling the company's fleet in a coverage area that extends from Waukegan north to Milwaukee. Stamm's locations are part of a network of 41 TowBoatUS locations on the Great Lakes and 300 across the country.

"When boats break down and need a tow to the launch ramp

or harbor, a battery jump, or some fuel to make it home, two ports are better than one," said Capt. Stamm. "The 50-mile distance between Chicago and the former port in Kenosha was shortened by moving the port south to Waukegan. We also added Racine, which means faster TowBoatUS response times throughout our service area. When your boat breaks down on the water and you don't know what to do, call us. We know how to get you safely home, and boaters tell us they get a great sense of relief when we arrive on scene."

Much like an auto club for recreational boat owners, BoatUS offers an Unlimited Freshwater Towing Membership for just \$72 a year. Boaters face costs that average \$700 per towing incident – with some paying into the thousands out of pocket – when they don't have an annual BoatUS Towing Membership.

All of Stamm's experienced captains are US Coast Guard licensed. TowBoatUS Racine is located at Pugh Marina. The port has a



25-foot former US Coast Guard SAFE Boat with a welded aluminum-plate hull and hard foam sides, custom-built to take vessels safely in tow. An all-weather Parker 25 is located at TowBoatUS Waukegan in Waukegan Municipal Harbor. Both are rigged for towing, jump starts, fuel delivery and soft ungroundings, ready to go 24 hours a day and easily recognizable by their red hulls and TowBoatUS name and logo emblazoned in bright white letters on their sides.

Separate from BoatUS on-water Towing Services, Stamm's company also refloats sunken boats and provides salvage services. NEW RESOURCE GUIDE FOR RECREATIONAL BOATING SKILLS INSTRUCTORS

The U.S. Coast Guard's National On-Water Standards (NOWS) Program grant management team and American Boat and Yacht Council (ABYC) have announced the publication of an American National Standard for the on-the-water instruction for beginner-level recreational boating operators.

The new Instructional Approach Standard helps boating safety educators design and deliver boating skills instruction that takes place on the water.

The standard is founded on the best practices and guidance of recreational boating experts from around the country. It identifies 14 priority characteristics boating instruction experts know are most important to consider when offering high-quality on-water instruction for skills development. These characteristics focus on the method of skills-based instruction as well as the qualities of the people and organization needed to effectively deliver it.



Education providers large and small, established or new, will find the standard helpful to design or update approaches to onwater instruction. It identifies the qualities of an effective approach and lets providers figure out how best to design them into their programs. Therefore, providers can use the new standard to develop approaches to instruction that work best for their unique situations.

The new Instructional Approach Standard comes with a 77-page How to Guide. This comprehensive Technical Support Document (TSD) gives education providers detailed information to help understand and use the content of the Instructional Approach Standard to design a safe and effective approach to on-water skills-based instruction.

The Instructional Approach Standard and its TSD work together with the powerboating, human-propelled craft and sailing American National Standards previously developed by the NOWS Program. These skills standards identify the skills students should be able to demonstrate as a result of participating in skills-based instruction. Together, the approach and skills standards help boating safety educators design and deliver high quality on-water instruction that gives entry-level boaters the skills and experience they need to safely operate a recreational boat.

On-water instruction for skills development is the future of boating safety education. The four standards provide all recreational boating educators a powerful set of common national standards for what skills to deliver and how to deliver them. Together, they will help raise the level of quality, consistency and availability of boating safety skills education across the country – increasing the level of safety and enjoyment recreational boaters experience on our nation's waterways in the process.

Background:

The National On-Water Standards (NOWS) Program is a collaboration initiative lead by a diverse group of 27 volunteer Subject Matter Experts from many different recreational boating organizations across the recreational boating community.

Funded in part from US Coast Guard Grants awarded to US Sailing, and facilitated by a professional facilitator, the purpose of the NOWS Program is to help raise the overall quality, consistency and availability of recreational boating entry-level skills instruction throughout the United States.

It does this by developing national standards, tools and other resources education providers can use to design and deliver on-water instruction that trains people to operate recreational powerboats, sailboats or human-propelled craft.

The ultimate goal is to increase the level of safety and enjoyment recreational boaters experience on our nation's waterways... saving lives in the process.



SPRING COMMISSIONING CHECKLIST

With boatyards, backyards, marinas, and clubs now coming to life, spring commissioning time has arrived. Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS) has a Spring Commissioning Checklist to help boaters start the season right: **Before You Launch**:

1. Hose clamps should be inspected and replaced as necessary. Double clamp below-waterline connections, including all hose and fuel lines with marine-rated stainless hose clamps and keeping seacocks closed when you are away are wise moves.

- 2. Inspect cooling hoses for stiffness, rot, leaks and cracking. Make sure they fit snugly.
- 3. Replace deteriorated sacrificial anodes.
- 4. Inspect prop(s) for dings, pitting and distortion. Make sure cotter pins are secure. Grip the prop and try moving the shaft if it's loose, the cutless bearing (on inboard drive systems) may need to be replaced.
- 5. Check the rudderstock to ensure it hasn't been bent.
- 6. Inspect the hull for blisters, distortions and stress cracks.
- 7. Make sure your engine intake sea strainer is not cracked or bent from ice, free of corrosion, and is clean and properly secured.

8. With inboards, check the engine shaft and rudder stuffing boxes for looseness. A stuffing box should only leak when the prop shaft is turning and needs to be inspected routinely.

9. Inspect and lubricate seacocks.

10. Use a garden hose to check for deck leaks at ports and hatches. Renew caulk or gaskets as necessary.

11. Inspect bilge pump and float switch to make sure they're working properly.

- 12. Check stove and remote tanks for loose fittings and leaking hoses.
- 13. Inspect dock and anchor lines for chafing.
- 14. If equipped, ensure that the stern drain plug is installed.
- 15. After the boat is launched, be sure to check all through-hulls for leaks.

Engine Outdrives and Outboards:

1. Inspect rubber outdrive bellows for cracked, dried and/or deteriorated spots (look especially in the folds) and replace if suspect.

- 2. Check power steering and power trim oil levels.
- 3. Replace anodes that are more than half worn away.
- 4. Inspect outer jacket of control cables. Cracks or swelling indicate corrosion and mean that the cable must be replaced.

Engines and Fuel Systems:

1. Inspect fuel lines, including fill and vent hoses, for softness, brittleness or cracking. Check all joints for leaks, and make sure all lines are well supported with noncombustible clips or straps with smooth edges.

2. Inspect fuel tanks, fuel pumps and filters for leaks. Ensure portable tanks and lines are completely drained of stale fuel before filling with new fuel. Clamps should be snug and free of rust. Clean or replace fuel filters.

3. Every few years, remove and inspect exhaust manifolds for corrosion.

4. Charge battery. Clean and tighten electrical connections, especially both ends of battery cables. Wire-brush battery terminals and fill cells with distilled water (if applicable).

5. Inspect bilge blower hose for leaks.

Sailboat Rigging:

1. Inspect swage fittings for cracks and heavy rust (some discoloration is acceptable). Inspect wire halyards and running backstays for "fishhooks" and rust.

- 2. Remove tape on turnbuckles and lubricate threads, preferably with Teflon. Replace old tape with fresh tape.
- 3. If you suspect the core around a chainplate is damp, remove the chainplate to inspect and make repairs.

Trailers:

1. Inspect tire treads and sidewalls for cracks or lack of tread and replace as necessary. Check air pressure – don't forget the spare.

- 2. Inspect wheel bearings and repack as necessary.
- 3. Test all lights and winch to make sure they're working properly. Inspect hitch chains.
- 4. Inspect trailer frame for rust. Sand and paint to prevent further deterioration.
- 5. Inspect brakes and brake fluid reservoir.





Safety:

1. Check expiration dates on flares. Inspect fire extinguishers. Replace if over 12 years old. Over 40 million Kidde extinguishers with plastic handles were recalled on Nov. 2, 2017.

2. Make sure you have properly sized and wearable life jackets in good condition for each passenger, including kids. Check inflatable life jacket cylinders.

- 3. Test smoke, carbon monoxide, fume and bilge alarms.
- 4. Check running lights and spare bulb inventory.
- 5. Update paper charts, chart plotter software.
- 6. Replenish first aid kit items that may have been used last season.

7. Be sure to get a free vessel safety check from the US Coast Guard Auxiliary or US Power Squadrons. Find out more at <u>www.SafetySeal.net</u>.

For the Dock:

1. Check both ends of the shore power cable connections for burns, which indicate the cable and/or boat's shore power inlet or the dock's receptacle must be replaced.

2. Test ground-fault protection on your boat and private dock, and know how to prevent Electric Shock Drowning (<u>https://www.boatus.com/pressroom/release.asp?id=1308</u>).

The Paperwork:

- 1. Make sure your boat registration is up to date. Don't forget your trailer tags.
- 2. Review your boat insurance policy and update coverage if needed. Provide a copy to your marina or club.

3. If applicable, ensure your BoatUS Towing Membership is in good standing. Log in to <u>www.BoatUS.com/Account</u> to check your membership status or join at <u>www.BoatUS.com</u>.





We welcome any offshore one design entries, multi-hulls, shorthanded sailors and a cruising fleet.



Plans are underway to make the 2018 Queen's Cup Race a success ashore and afloat. We have an awesome party planned for Thursday June 21st with great food and entertainment. This year's band will feature The Sentinels. These guys will get the place rockin' from the first song and keep the party on its feet right to the end of the last set.

The 2018 Queen's Cup will finish in Grand Haven, Michigan, with Grand River Sailing Club hosting what promises to be a great weekend. Approximately 50 slips are available in the Grand Haven Marina. THE HOOK: RACINE YACHT CLUB'S DEATH'S DOOR CHALLENGE

Racine Yacht Club's "HOOK" Race is our premier sailing event and 2018 marks its 35th running. Sailed annually on the same weekend as the Chicago-Mackinac race, it was born from an idea that was kicked around by Yacht Club members who thought a distance race from Racine through "Death's Door" at the tip of the Door County peninsula to a port in Green Bay might be able to gain some traction. A simpler, lower cost alternative to the 'Mac, it would allow skippers and crews who couldn't make the 'Mac to take less time off and still do a distance race. It is also a great way for folks to get their boats north to the cruising grounds in Green Bay, the Door County area, and points north. The race offers strong competition with the navigational challenge of Death's Door. Designed primarily for racers with fully crewed boats, divisions for cruisers (who can do some motoring), single and double-handers, and multihulls have been added over the years.

Our first HOOK was sailed in 1984 with twelve boats racing from Racine, Wisconsin, up the lake through the Death's Door passage between Door County, Wisconsin, and Washington Island and on into Green Bay, ending across the bay at Menominee,

Michigan's M&M Yacht Club--a distance of some 189 miles. The finish line is between a trailer on the marina seawall and a buoy just offshore. On Saturday morning, July 21, the cruising fleet's first warning is at 0830 hours followed by the racing fleet's first warning at 0900. The race officially ends after all boats have finished or the time limit expires, which is at 5:00 PM Monday. From that first race the HOOK fleet has, on occasion, grown to more than fifty boats.

Rudolph co-founded the Red8 Boat Works while in Traverse City, which works with High School aged students teaching skills needed to build boats and character. He was introduced to Sheboygan and SEAS when his first mate on the *Champion* asked him to be the coach for the US Blind Sailing Team for the 2014 Blind World Championship in Sheboygan.

"I look forward to helping SEAS grow and the challenges of building new programs in the Sheboygan area. It is a rewarding experience watching young people develop new skills and achieving a greater sense of self," Rudolph said.

GRANT RECIPIENT REPORTS

With the assistance from LMSRF and their Grants in Aid program our team, Andrew Van Sickle (South Shore Yacht Club), Heather Robertson (South Shore Yacht Club), Christopher Laing (Windjammers Sailing Club) and myself Michael Laing (Windjammers Sailing Club) were able to attend the St. Petersburg North U and National One Design Sailing Academy's Flying Tiger 7.5 training, February 14-18, 2018. The Flying Tigers are modern performance sailboats with retracting poles, asymmetrical kites and square top mainsails. This report is written with the perspectives of each team member to best present what we learned, skills we can use on Lake Michigan and help spread sailing knowledge to fellow sailors.

For 5 days, I had the fortunate experience to sail as part of the North U Regatta experience aboard a Flying Tiger 7.5 meter in St. Petersburg, Florida. The first two days were with onboard coaches teaching boat handling, tactics, weather patterns, currents, and sail trim. They then set up small racecourses to practice starting techniques and mark roundings. The wind forecast for the first two days were light, so lots of time was spent discussing weight distribution, roll tacking, and upwind sail shape to help keep the boat moving in the light air. Lead instructor Bill Gladstone videotaped us throughout the day to be used during classroom debriefings. A unique aspect of Tampa Bay is the amount of current that exists during a flooding tide. A racer can do well just by picking the correct side of the course to maximize or minimize the effects of current depending on the situation. This information will become invaluable for future races in the bay. All of the information gained in the first two days was applied in the final three days of racing. We saw varying wind conditions that proved challenging, but our crew worked well together and we rounded out the weekend with a third place podium finish. Thank you to the members LMRSF for their support to our team in



increasing our knowledge and skills in sailboat racing. I'd highly recommend this course to any racers that want to take their program to the next level.--Andrew Van Sickle

I have raced for most of my life but during the North Regatta Experience it really hit me that I have lacked any formal training. We had two days of coaching with a coach on each boat that could see exactly what we were doing and make suggestions on how to improve. I really appreciated the flexibility of then having our coach watch from the chase boat so that during the regatta we could attempt to put what we had learned about starts, upwind trim, communication and tactics into practice. After each race we would get feedback on what we had done, and what we should change. I look forward to the next Wisconsin sailing season to share what I learned with the boats that I race on and continue to improve my own racing skills. I would recommend this clinic for any level of racer that is looking to improve their skills.--Heather Robertson

The North U regatta experience aboard the Flying Tiger 7.5 in the 2018 NOOD-St. Petersburg regatta was a fantastic educational event. Each of the 5 days included a pre-briefing of course conditions and expectations, followed by on the water racing, then a debrief of the day including discussion about successful techniques and tactics. All of this added more tips and tricks to our overall racing 'toolkit.' One rather unique activity our team conducted was to rotate positions on the same boat over a short period of time in similar conditions. During the 5-day event, each crewmember had the opportunity to skipper, trim sails, work pit, and call tactics in a live race environment. This not only provided each us with a more fulfilling experience, but also a clearer perspective on what is required from each individual team member's position in order to make the boat go fast. For example, as a mainsail trimmer, I now have a better sense of how my mainsail trim might make boat handling easier or more difficult and unbalanced for the helmsman. Likewise, how easing and trimming a jib properly for a puff or lull will keep the boat powered up. Another primary focus our coach had the team explore on was continuous communication. There is a lot of information to read on a race course and no individual can take it all in while keeping the boat moving at optimal performance. As a team, we are stronger when sharing what we observe to the point it becomes white noise. Doing so keeps the team focused and efficient. Additionally, we learned to share incremental information between the sail trimmers and the skipper, i.e.: the spinnaker trimmer indicates to the skipper when there is pressure to sail 2 clicks deeper and when to steer up for more air provides valuable feedback to keep the boat moving at top VMG and therefore optimal course and speed. I look forward to utilizing these perspectives, skills, and techniques regularly in all future racing events.--Christopher Laing

The key to our successful 3rd was, communication of everything. From countdowns to the next puff, headers and lifters, speed and heading of nearby boats, what the trimmer is set for (eased for speed and power or trimmed in for height) and where the next gust is going to be. It really was, like Christopher said, "white noise." Our bad races were either because I ran over the offset mark or it was because we weren't talking to each other. Our coach referred to it as the GNN (Good News Network). As the usual skipper on the boats I sail in Green Bay, I have never experienced this much communication onboard before. After this event, I cannot emphasize how critical it is as a skipper to have your crew talk to you. It frees up your mind to keep the boat in the groove. The trimmers must never be quiet and communicate what they're doing with the trim based on the ever-changing wind speeds and angles. This was a lighter air event and one topic that was discussed with our coach was easing in the lulls and easing the moment you are hit with a puff. In the lulls, the boat is starving for power. With the high aspect blade jibs, keel and rudder, this boat thrived off of boat speed, of course, most boats do. In the puffs, the apparent wind angle becomes larger and there is about a five second window where the jib is not perfectly trimmed. The driver cannot, and should not, adjust the angle of the boat to match the new apparent wind angle. This is commonly known as a velocity lift. Instead, the jib trimmer should communicate how far and when the jib sheet is eased for the puff. This allows the boat to accelerate much more quickly, bringing the apparent wind angle back to normal and the jib trimmer can trim the jib back to "pointing mode." Again, communication is key with this skill. We had the opportunity to take a redress with the race committee since our position was incorrect with one race. Initially, the redress committee did not have enough evidence to overrule the recorded positions which allowed us to gain experience with a formal protest. We were able to provide enough evidence with testimonies from the North U and 1D coaches. This was our first protest and hopefully our last. There is only so much we can share in writing. The actual experience is truly the only way to fully learn these skills and the importance of using those skills at the right time. We were familiar with most of the topics discussed in the classroom but without the encouragement from all of the coaches, it's difficult to grasp the importance of following through with the communication, practicing the skills and repeating the skills you read about. Many, many thanks to LMSRF and their Grants in Aid program for helping make this experience possible.--Michael Laing

NEW FORMAT FOR 2018 PARA WORLD SAILING CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2018 Para World Sailing Championships will take place September 16-22 in Sheboygan, Wisconsin. This edition will showcase new formats including "Heat style" racing for the RS Venture Connect and medal races in all disciplines.

DISCIPLINES AND RACING FORMAT:

- Single Person Keelboat (Technical) Open Gender 2.4mr Norlin One Design (OD) fleet racing with a Medal Race
- Single Person Keelboat (Non-Technical) Male Hansa 303 Short course fleet racing, shared charter boat with a Medal Race
- Single Person Keelboat (Non-Technical) Female Hansa 303 Short course fleet racing, shared charter boat with a Medal Race

• Two Person Keelboat – Open Gender – RS Venture Connect – Short course fleet racing, shared charter boat with late stage knockouts. The winner of the final race will win the event

The all new RS Venture Connect two-person dinghy will be included in the Para Worlds for the first time ever. The two-seat standard configuration on the RS Venture Connect was recommended to the Para World Sailing Committee (PWSC) by RS Sailing and has been vetted for safety and classification for the 2018 World Championships. The RS Venture Connect was selected by the PWSC at the 2017 Annual Conference in Mexico for use at the Worlds.

The boat can be sailed by males and/or females and all competitors must have a valid International Classification under the current Para-Classification Rules for World Sailing. The total points of each team in the RS Venture Connect shall not exceed 8 points unless there is a female on the team. The total number of classification points can be increased by one for each female aboard.

As the PWSC continue to gather input and feedback on sailors regarding ongoing evolution and evaluation of equipment, safety factors and classification, competitors racing in Sheboygan will be invited to test the RS Venture Connect single center line seat configuration with a crew permitted to sit on the rail.

The one-person boat, Hansa 303, made its Para World Sailing Championship debut at the 2017 edition in Kiel, Germany. Piotr Cichocki (POL) and Violeta del Reino (ESP) took the inaugural men's and women's title. The sailors in the Hansa will need to meet the minimal disability criteria for Para World Sailing Classification and the men and women will compete in separate fleets again in 2018.

The RS Venture Connect and the Hansa 303 boats will be provided by World Sailing for the championships, reducing costs for sailors.

The third class to be included in the Para Worlds will be the one-person keelboat, Norlin 2.4mr OD. This is a technical and highly adaptable boat made to meet the needs of each sailor. Unlike the Hansa 303, males and females can compete together in the class. Sailors competing in this event will need to meet minimum disability classification requirements.

ADAPTIVE PROGRAM OPEN HOUSE

On June 2, 2018, Traverse Area Community Sailing will be holding an open house at their site on Boardman Lake in Traverse City, Michigan.

The Adaptive Sailing Program will feature a Clinic/Come and Try Day to introduce individuals, sailing clubs, and yacht clubs in the Great Lakes Region to Adaptive Sailing. TACS has the largest fleet of Hansa boats in the Midwest, including three Hansa 303's and two 2.3's. Participants will be able to:

- 1. Learn about disabilities and safety concerns
- 2. Experience program development, and learn how to get started
- 3. Tour barrier free facility and participant lift demonstrations.
- 4. Have the opportunity to sail our Adaptive boats.



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5. Use Transfer benches and other adaptations that might be appropriate for your site

Adaptive Sailing is a program designed to bring the joy of sailing to ALL individuals. Our small boats allow a safe and comfortable way to get on the water. Our lift system helps those with limited mobility get in and out of boats. Participants are paired with an experienced sailor until they choose to sail independently. Some of our participants were sailors before they had a stroke or were in a car accident and are now able to get back on the water. We also serve individuals who are blind, cognitively impaired, hearing impaired and those with multiple impairments. We provide all adaptations needed for a successful experience.

The Hansa 303 boat is a very fun boat. This small boat is used around the world for both leisure and competitive sailing, although other boats can be successfully adapted for our population as well.

This event will be held from 10:00-2:00 on June 2, 2018. Limited registrations will be accepted by email or phone. There is no cost for this event and lunch will be on your own. Please bring your own life jacket. Traverse Area Community Sailing (650 Hannah Ave., Traverse City, MI.)

OLYMPIC DEVELOPMENT TEAM PROFILE

Lake Michigan is home to one of the duos working to represent USA in the 2020 Olympic Games – Japan in the 49er. Learn about their background, goals, and ways you can cheer them on to their goal.

US 49er TEAM CHRISTOPHER RAST AND TREVOR BURD



Christopher Rast found his love for competitive sailing while growing up in Switzerland. After a few successful junior years in the 420 he moved on to the 470 and qualified for the Olympic Games, representing Switzerland at Atlanta 1996 and again at Athens 2004. Chris then continued in his Olympic pursuits with Beijing 2008 for Team USA, finishing 6th, just a few places short of a medal.

Chris has had the privilege to sail under the Macatawa Bay Yacht Club (Holland, Michigan) burgee since 2011 when he married collegiate sailing All-American Danielle Gamache. His busy sailing schedule since then included campaigning in

his Melges 24, winning both the World and European Championships together with Danielle and an aggressive Moth program, finishing 7th at the World Championships in 2015 among the world's best sailors.

He has also sailed with Michael Kiss's Melges 20 *Bacio*; Dr. John Arendhorst's J/70 *Blink* 20/20; Doug DeVos' Melges 32 *Delta*; Bob Hughes's Melges 32 *Heartbreaker* and, of course, on Roger Gamache's S2 7.9 *Matros*.

Chris is now taking another shot at winning an Olympic Medal together with his new crew Trevor Burd. Multiple training camps and regattas in 2017, coupled with a solid performance at the test event for this year's World Sailing Championships in Aarhus, Denmark, gave them the opportunity to analyze their strengths and weaknesses, study their compatibility and forge a strong team. The road to the Olympic Games in Tokyo in 2020 is long and challenging.

Trevor Burd was a late entrant to the waters of competitive sailing, only beginning to race in earnest around age 16. Starting in the Club 420, he quickly moved on to the F18 catamaran and 505 dinghy, taking advantage of his size and physicality. He fell in love with crewing fast boats. Trevor's first experience in the 49er came in 2010 and he has been campaigning the boat off and on since then.

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He has been a member of the US Sailing Team since 2013, with additional years spent on the Development Team before that. A major effort was put toward a full-time campaign for the 2016 Olympic Games with Brad Funk in the 49er. After coming up short at the 2016 Trials, Trevor began to expand his sailing skills by returning to catamaran sailing as the training partner for Bora Gulari in the Nacra 17 with Team USA for the Rio Olympics.

Trevor is now a fixture in top-level catamaran competition. He sailed alongside Taylor Canfield with Team USOne on the World Match Race Tour in 2017, as well as taking on the Extreme Sailing Series in the GC32 for several events. He has also competed on a number of M32 teams, most recently with Dan Cheresh onboard the latest *Extreme2*. Other projects have included Melges 20 sailing with MBYC member Drew Weirda and, most diversely, winning the 2017 R2AK (Race to Alaska), a 750 cold water mile sailboat race from Port Townsend, Washington, to Ketchikan, Alaska, with his two brothers.

Since 2016, Trevor has tried to stay in the 49er class with the goal of returning to the top. He won his second North American title in the fall of 2016. Unfinished business includes a successful Olympic campaign. The partnership with Chris gives them both the chance to take on and beat the best.

The 2020 Summer Olympic Games will be held in Tokyo from July 24-August 9, 2020. The sailing competitions will take place in Sagami Bay, about 50 miles South of Tokyo, while using the marina on Enoshima Island as the Olympic Sailing Venue.

A total of nineteen 49ers will be competing for Olympic Gold. The USA has won only one medal so far in 49er, in its inaugural debut in 2000 when Jonathan and Charlie McKee took the Bronze Medal. Chris (together with Tim Wadlow) finished 6th place in 2008 in Qingdao.

Chris and Trevor are currently the top ranked US 49er Team and their main goal of the 2018 season is to qualify the USA for the Olympic Games. Only a total of 18 spots are up for grabs at the Olympic Games (the host nation Japan automatically qualifies) and the first eight will be determined in August at this year's ISAF World Championships in Aarhus, Denmark. A rigorous

training and competition schedule will allow them to prepare together with the rest of the US 49er Sailing Squad. The yearly budget for a campaign, which includes travel and equipment expenses, entry fees and a minimal amount of personal expenses, is close to \$200K. Unfortunately, US Sailing does not have the means to contribute financially, but does cover most of the coaching costs and overseas logistical support. Therefore we are very much dependent on support from our clubs and individual donors.

WIM SERIES ANNOUNCES 2018 SERIES

The Women's International Match Racing Series today announced the 2018 series schedule with events in Finland, Sweden, Russia and the US Virgin Islands. This year marks the sixth consecutive season of the WIM Series, the world's first and only women's professional sailing series founded in 2012.

Up to 30 of the top women's match racing teams will battle for the coveted series trophy starting in Helsinki (Finland) 25-29 June followed by back-to-back events in Lysekil (Sweden) 6-11 August, and Ekaterinburg (Russia) 14-18 August. The Series finale will be staged in the turquoise waters of St. Thomas in the US Virgin Islands 29 November – 2 December. A penultimate fifth event is expected to be added to the schedule in September and the Series is keen to also add a US event.

Since its launch in 2012, the WIM Series has delivered 23 events worldwide, attracting over 400 female sailors from 25 countries including Olympic sailors, National and World Champions. Each year, one of the Series events also plays host to the Women's Match Racing World Championship, sanctioned by the sports global governing body, World Sailing.

"In the last few years, there has been a significant rise in women's participation in sport, and sailing is just one example of where both men and women also compete on a level playing field. We have the highest number of teams registered for this year's WIM Series."

British skipper Lucy McGregor (GBR) and her team won both WIM Series events that they entered last year, one being the World Championship in Helsinki.

"Retaining the World Championship title is our main goal of this year. In addition to sailing the Worlds we will be competing in the Argo Group Bermuda Gold Cup this year which we are really looking forward to", said McGregor adding: "We will have some of the same team as last year but also a couple of changes. Different boats often requires a slightly different dynamic in the team."

Anna Östling and her Team Anna have been ranked as the number one female match racing team in the world since August 2016, and they are looking forward to entering the new season.

"A big goal for us is the regatta in Lysekil, it's our home event and of course it means a lot to us. We are focused in our own performance and being as good a team as we can be, and we also want to help encourage other younger teams to make the sport as good as it can be. The WIM Series is a great platform for match racing and it helps more sailors get into the sport", says Anna Östling, skipper of team Anna and two-time World Match Racing Champion.

The WIM Series is looking at adding events to the 2018 calendar. And, as the only international professional sailing series for women, the Series aims to inspire both female and male sailors all over the world. In addition to competing at different venues on the WIM Series, teams will also be tested with sailing different boats at each event, one of the unique elements of the match racing series. The yachts, usually 20-30ft in length and designed for 5 crew, are supplied by each event. The class of boats will range from the J/80's in Helsinki, to the Far East 28's in Sweden, Ricochet 747's in Russia, and the classic IC24's in St. Thomas.

"It's the ultimate test of skill for any match racing team" continues Anna Holmdahl White. "They have to adapt to different sailing conditions and also different boats at each event. It's not easy, but it's what makes a true Champion."



2018 US SAILING TEAM ROSTER ANNOUNCED

US Sailing, the national governing body for the sport, has named 20 Olympicclass athletes to the 2018 US Sailing Team. The national team is selected annually and is comprised of the top sailors competing in the events selected for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. The roster is assembled from a



combination of sailors who qualified based on results at 2017 class world championships, the 2017 Aarhus Test Event, World Cup Series Miami USA 2018, and additional accomplished athletes who receive discretionary selection from the Chief of U.S. Olympic Sailing, two-time Olympic Champion Malcolm Page (Newport, R.I.). Through the US Sailing Team and its sponsors, athletes on the Olympic path receive financial, logistical, coaching, technical, fitness, marketing and communications support.

"This year is going to be crucial for our sailors as they pursue their Tokyo 2020 campaigns, with the first national Olympic Games qualifier regatta, the Hempel Sailing World Championships Aarhus 2018, fast approaching this August," said Page. "The sailors on this list will proudly represent the United States at Aarhus and at other major events around the world, and work to achieve their own goals while also helping each other, our staff and our supporters build a stronger U.S. Olympic sailing program."

For many athletes on the US Sailing Team, the pursuit of an Olympic medal represents a challenging journey on several levels; a chase for the podium means reaching for difficult physical, technological, financial and even psychological goals.

"I'm a big believer that you still have to conquer yourself," said Rio 2016 Olympian and Nacra 17 athlete Helena Scutt (Kirkland, Wash.). "You can't end up on top of the podium unless you have full control of your mental state and you've pushed yourself to your limits physically." Laser athlete Chris Barnard (Newport Beach, Calif.) added that the self-discovery aspect of campaigning for the Olympic Games is an essential, if often overlooked, part of being on the team. "Growing as a person [as I've trained], I've become more confident and aware each day of 'this is how I operate," said Barnard.

For many athletes on the national team, an essential aspect of their desire to chase an Olympic medal comes from competing against the world's best sailors. "This utmost respect for the playing field on which we compete makes sailing so incredible," said 49er helmsman Judge Ryan (San Diego, Calif.).

TISC and the St. Francis Sailing Foundation have worked together on existing community sailing programs including the highly successful Set Sail Learn program for San Francisco public school 4th graders.

"We are thrilled about this new partnership and what it means for the kids in our community. Whether they join the Youth Racing Team, train to be a coach or teacher, or intern at a technology lab, there will be opportunities for them to become leaders in the sport of sailing," said Carisa Harris, President of TISC.

"US Sailing's commitment to FAST USA at TISC is comprehensive and unwavering," said Jack Gierhart, CEO of US Sailing. "A revolutionary new facility of this kind at a well-established community sailing center will change the face of sailing on the West Coast. FAST USA will offer greatly expanded opportunities to experience and enjoy sailing in one of the world's best sailing venues. We are proud to be a part of it."

To highlight the launch of FAST USA, US Sailing has designated Treasure Island Sailing Center as one of the primary national training centers for the US Sailing Team. Forming the centerpiece of the new Olympic-level facility will be an extensive containerbased structure that previously served as an America's Cup team base and was donated to US Sailing in 2017. US Sailing selected TISC as the new home for this cutting-edge facility as well as several top national team coaches and staff.

"We are grateful to our partners at the St. Francis Sailing Foundation and TISC for working with us to make this concept a gamechanging reality for US Sailing Team athletes," said Malcolm Page, two-time Olympic gold medalist and Chief of U.S. Olympic Sailing. "FAST USA will not only help us change the culture of our team and make us more competitive, but give us a technical edge that no other national sailing team has."

San Francisco Bay is known to competitive sailors worldwide for superb, year-round sailing conditions and areas optimal for both training and racing. The Bay offers a "menu" of varied conditions of wind and waves to suit the needs of students, athletes and coaches.

With technology playing an increasingly critical role in high-end athletics, FAST USA places America's top sailing talent at the hub of U.S high-tech research and development. The Bay Area offers proximity to outstanding institutions of higher education and an ethos of innovation. The US Sailing Team's technical staff will have access to an unprecedented breadth of technical solutions that will propel American sailors to medal-winning results.

"With the creation of FAST USA at TISC, we can offer high-level training opportunities for both Bay Area sailors and Olympic hopefuls that currently do not exist," said Bill Kreysler, President of the St. Francis Sailing Foundation. "This facility will bridge existing gaps between youth, high school, collegiate and high-performance sailing. FAST USA will be the first facility of its kind in the nation, and we are thrilled to have US Sailing putting the wind at our back here in San Francisco. The seamless pathway we



envision is a perfect fit for US Sailing's joint goals of expanding sailing access on the west coast and winning Olympic medals."



2018 U.S. National Championship at Midwinters St. Andrews Bay Yacht Club, Panama City, Florida

March 22-24, 2018

Reigning World Champion Alonso Collantes saved his best performance for the last day to top the 42-boat fleet and win the 2018 Sunfish U.S. National

Championship at Midwinters, held March 22-24 in Panama City, FL. After ten races, former World Champion Johnathan Martinetti and Alonso Collantes were tied at 42 points while David Hernandez had 43. The eleventh and last race was going to be a three-way match to determine first, second, and third overall. After rounding the first leeward gate, Hernandez was second, Martinetti third, and Collantes fourth. Martinetti was yellow flagged for the second time in the regatta and had to retire from the race, paving the way for Collantes to closely follow Hernandez around the race course and finish one boat behind to win the tie-breaker. Martin Alsogaray had to survive a broken outhaul end-cap, but benefited from Martinetti's RET on the last race to take third overall. Divisional awards went to Caterina Romero - top female and 5th overall, Eugene Schmitt - top master and 6th overall), and Adriana Barron - top youth and 10th overall. Guatemala, Argentina, and Ecuador clinched the three 2019 Pan American Games berths and will be joining host country Peru next year. Remaining Pan American Games berths will be decided at the 2018 South American Championship in Colombia in April and the 2018 North American

You can't sail to lose, you have to go out there to win and we intend to be aggressive right from the start. We feel confident in our boat speed and if we can get off the line we should do well. It's a tremendous regatta, I haven't seen competition like this in a long time." Unfortunately, this year, Keane's strategy did not quite unfold as planned, as he and his crew on *Savasana* were knocked out of the lead they held before race 7 to end the series in third overall from scores of 13,7. Smith, who sailed with Peter Duncan to win the 2017 J/70 World Championship, and his team on *Africa* held onto second overall. "Going into today there were four teams who were all phenomenal and anyone could have got it," said Patrick Wilson, trimmer on *Catapult*. "It was cut-throat out there and somehow we ended up winning. It came down to the last shift in the last race. It was amazingly close competitive sailing." Talking about their solid performance, Wilson continued, "We just sort of ground it out and stayed in good spots, did well and the whole team sailed really well together." A standout performance from Timothy Healy, who won the inaugural J/70 World Championship in 2014, and his crew, who won both races to move up from 8th overall to 5th. Heath

2018 91st Bacardi Cup

March 4-10, 2018

Star

In the 72-boat Star fleet, Diego Negri and Sergio Lambertenghi (ITA) managed to maintain the lead they opened the day with, retaining pole position as the battle heated up behind. Robert Scheidt (BRA) / Brian Fatih (USA) led the final race off the starting line, with Negri/ Lambertenghi languishing back around 7th place at the first mark - giving the title to Scheidt at that point in the race. A determined fight back unfolded from the Italians, accelerating in the first downwind to 3rd and ultimately crossing the finish line in 4th, whilst Scheidt/ Fatih lost ground and dropped back to 2nd in the final leg; in an unbelievably close finish. Negri/ Lambertenghi are the first ever Italian team to win, with Negri's name added to the Bacardi Cup Trophy, and Lambertenghi added the Tito Bacardi Cup. "We had a good start, played the left and some other boats played the right," explained Negri. "We were very close with another three boats for winning the Bacardi Cup. We arrived at the top mark around 7th to 8th but with a good call of judgement soon after the windward mark we succeed to recover in the first downwind, and rounded in 3rd so pretty safe for us, as we just needed to be in the top four." The pair held their position, and could afford to be overtaken by Paul Cayard/ Mark Strube (USA) in the final downwind leg, knowing they had victory in the bag. "It is a very good result and an amazing week and consistent, and I think we did a great job together," said Negri who, together with Lambertenghi, has claimed medals at each of the 2014, 2015 and 2016 Star World Championships. But it has taken thirteen years of competing at the Bacardi Cup for Negri to climb the mountain to victory. "It is a good feeling, and will be a good memory for all our life that is for sure," shared Negri. "Maybe there will be a next one in the future but this 91st edition is to us." "Winning the Bacardi, for me at least, I came here the first time in 1995 so more than twenty years ago, I have always been dreaming to win it," said Lambertenghi. "Being able to do it, thanks to my helmsman Diego, is super, super, super satisfying. The last leg until the end was just shaking, looking at the wind, looking at the other boats." Great Britain's Iain Percy and his Swedish crew Anders Ekstrom made their mark known by winning the final race, to finish in 7th overall. A formidable partnership, with three Star Class Olympic medals between them, the pair didn't compete in race 1, then a non-fault collision and virtual sinking forced them out of races 3 and 4, before claiming the race victory their pedigrees would predict. Prizes were also presented to winners in the Masters (skippers age 50 through 59), Grand Masters (skippers age 60 through 69), and Exalted Grand Masters (skippers age 70+) divisions, which went to Arthur Anosov/David Caesar (USA), Augie Diaz (USA)/Bruno Prada (BRA) and Alessandro Pascolato/Henry Boening (BRA) respectively. The Tammy Rubin Rice Trophy, awarded to the highest placing team in Bacardi Cup who did not win an award, was presented to Eric Doyle/Payson Infelise (USA).

2018 Nite National Championship

Green Lake, Green Lake, Wisconsin

March 3-4, 2018

In the iceboating world, the onset of spring means get your regattas in or pack it up. The normal drill is keep heading north until you find ice, but 2018 Nite National Championship on March 3-4 bucked the system and went south instead to Green Lake, Wisconsin – a small town on a big lake. With a good base of ice and access still remaining to launch boats, the local fleet of 23 Nite sailors in the Green Lake Ice Yacht Club pulled it all together and came up with ramps and improved access which is the key to iceboating in the spring. This year's event had 33 sailors competing in two fleets – gold fleet of 22 boats and a silver fleet of 11 boats. The two largest fleets participating were the Pewaukee Ice Yacht Club and the Green Lake Ice Yacht Club, but sailors from Mennekaunee and Four Lakes clubs were represented as well. This made for a great mix of younger sailors and older sailors, male and female. The first day of sailing brought moderate winds with softening ice as the sun rose. The swing in conditions made it an extreme test of ability and skill sets. There are hard ice sailors and mudders, and day one became a mudder's day with a total of five races completed – three gold and two silver. The race positions were all over the place but that makes the event all the better and interesting. With an early start on day two, all the pieces came together. Hard ice and a good breeze gave us our third race for the silver fleet which also eventually sailed four more races for the day. In the gold fleet, they completed four races with a couple of sailors finding the right groove to win multiple races each. With no finish worse than fifth, Tom Sweitzer took the title with local sailor Peter Vandervelde in second and the popular Harken guy Rick Wilfert in third overall. In the silver fleet, one of the oldest sailors of the class, Dick Grota, came out on top again. He sailed the perfect regatta after a throwout with six bullets in total. In second was Don Sanford and in third Kenny Kreider, their positions decided on a

All eight scheduled races were completed in gorgeous conditions at the J/24 Midwinter Championship, but Will Welles' *Bogus* only needed seven of them to tie up the victory. Rhode Island-based helmsman Welles led his team of Rich Bowen, Jock Hayes, PJ Schaffer and Nick Turney to a scoreline of 2,1,1,5,1,2,3 for 15 points, allowing them to forego the eighth and final race. Tony Parker's *Bangor Packet* secured second place with 33 points, six ahead of both Aidan Glackin's *Mental Floss* and Ron Medlin's *Bash*. Thirty-five teams competed. The *Bogus* team is a blended group of all J/24 World Champions – Welles, Bowen and Turney from *Cougar* in 2014 and Hayes and Schaffer from *Salsa* in 2004. This Championship was the first time they had all sailed together, and it was on a chartered boat. Welles names Miami as one of his favorite places to sail but his team definitely had to earn this win. "Super shifty and hard to see the puffs and lulls. There was a lot of gear shifting and trying to get on the lifted tack." The J/24 Midwinter Championship debuted 40 years ago in 1978 in Key West, Florida. "There are a lot of famous names today who cut their teeth in this Class," said Welles. "The difference today is that people know all the tricks when it comes to sail trim and rigging. It usually comes down to good starts and teamwork." Mark Laura's *Baba Louie* won both of Sunday's contests in about 10 knots of breeze.

2018 Melges 14 Midwinter Championship and Melges MC Scow Sarasota Bay Cup

Taking his grandfather's advice, Harry Melges IV started first and increased his lead — and ultimately won the Melges 14 Midwinter Championship. Adam Ankers of Privateer Yacht Club (Chattanooga, TN) sailed a consistent series to finish second while Daniel Thielman from Corinthian Yacht Club (San Francisco, CA) completed the podium in third. Day three saw a building 12-20 knot breeze which saw Melges, Lars Osell and Ankers stepping out to an early lead in Race Nine. Melges extended his lead on the final upwind to earn the W. Ankers sailed a strong final downwind to secure a second place. Race Ten of the event saw more tight action with Sergey Bolotin, Melges, Ankers and Thielman all coming into the finish seemingly at once. The final race of the series saw the biggest breeze yet. A steady 15 knots gusting upwards of 20 filled across the race course. A pin-skewed starting line and a backing breeze put Thielman out to an early lead. Melges, Bolotin and Ankers kept the burners on — not willing to give Thielman an easy time. The race order remained largely unchanged until the last half of the last run. Attempting to lock in one final bullet, Melges pressed Thielman high and off of the run line. Seeing this, Bolotin dove low and gained speed. Before Thielman and Melges had a chance to react, Bolotin surged into the lead and took the final race of the series. Thielman finished in second, securing his spot on the podium. The battle for the top female sailor saw Peyton Ankers and Jennifer Canestra face off, with Ankers taking the title after neck-and-neck racing all weekend long.

2018 Etchells Schoonmaker Cup

Biscayne Bay Yacht Club, Miami, Florida

March 2-4, 2018

The 2017-18 Etchells Biscayne Bay Regatta Series wrapped up with the 3-day Midwinters East Regatta for the Schoonmaker Cup on March 2-4 in Miami, FL. Fortyfour boats came out to beautiful Biscayne Bay for the scheduled 8-race regatta, under the auspices of Etchells Fleet 20 and Biscayne Bay Yacht Club. The regatta serves as the last opportunity to win the coveted series championship. The scoring for the overall series crown is comprised of a boat's best two finish places in the first three regattas of the series plus her score in the Midwinter Championship Regatta. Going into the finale, three teams were separated by two points. Jim Cunningham on Lifted was sitting on top with two points. British Olympic Medalist Lawrie Smith, on Alfie, was in second with three points. Reigning Etchells World Champion, Steve Benjamin on Scimitar sat in third position with four points. They were all primed to duke it out for the crown. On Friday, the chamber of commerce was back in charge of the weather. Partly cloudy skies, temperatures in the upper seventies, and a nice breeze of nine knots were a welcome respite to those here from northern climes and Europe. PRO Stuart Childerley got the first four leg race off on time at a bearing of 320, with a first leg distance of 1.4 nautical miles. Scott Kaufman on American Jane II, sailing with Lucas Calabrase, Austen Anderson, and Jesse Kirkland, were the quickest out of the gates, winning the first race wire to wire, an impressive achievement in the shifty winds. Second went to Andrew Cumming with Ante Razmilovic in third. The second race saw the same shifty breeze in the 9 knot range from the northwest. This race also saw a boat lead from start to finish with Lawrie Smith taking the horn on Alfie. Sailing with Lawrie were Richard Parslow, Joao Matos Rosa, and Goncalo Riberio. Second and third went to Scott Kaufman and Michael Goldfarb, respectively. A five-leg course was set for race three at the same bearing of 320, although the wind was getting more and more shifty. The fleet was greeted by a 20 degree right shift at the top mark favoring those who chose the right side. Marvin Beckman, the 2013 Etchells World Champion, rode the shift to round first. He gave back a few spots on the downwind with newly minted U.S. Sailing Yachtsman of the Year, Peter Duncan, taking over the lead. He was joined on Raging Rooster by Andrew Palfrey, Victor Diaz de Leon, and Sasha Ryan. Reigning Etchells World Champion Steve Benjamin finished second and George Francisco finished third. After racing Benjamin commented, "The wind in race three was one of the shiftiest I've ever seen. A huge righty came in just before the second gate and it really helped us. We took the left gate, looking downwind, and by the time we rounded we were looking at a reach to the finish. I told the guys to get the spinnaker pole ready, and they laughed at me. After a minute or two, up went the kite, and we kept it up right until the finish. I think we passed 17 boats to finish second." The big shift led to a bit of last second chaos on the signal boat. The 180 degree shift didn't reach the finish line until the first boats were just a few hundred yards from the line. The signal boat swung 180 degrees on its anchor, leaving the finish line flag on the wrong side of the boat, and the pin in the wrong position. Only the quick work by

PRO Childerley and the BBYC race committee staved off a crazy finish. As PRO Stuart Childerley, a former Etchells World Champion himself, said, "The shift happened at a good time in the scheme of things, so the fleet didn't invert. It did make for some interesting tactical calls on the last leg." Sitting in first after day one was Scott Kaufman with 13 points. He was followed by Peter Duncan with 16, and Robert Alderdice with 23. Series leaders Cunningham, Smith and Benjamin were in 25th, 13th and 6th respectively. The battle for the Series Championship was opening up. Saturday's weather forecast was for more of the same, and it was once again accurate. In fact it turned out nicer than Friday. Clear skies and 70 degrees welcomed the fleet to the bay. Winds were 9 knots from the north, with some stronger puffs. A four leg course was set, and they were off. Ante Razmilovic, Jim Cunningham, Kevin Grainger, Mark Watson and Robert Alderdice, battled it out, changing places throughout the race. Ante, sailing his Swedish Blue with Andrew Mills and Phillip Carlson aboard, held on for the gun. Kevin Grainger took second about a boat length ahead of the next three. Mark Watson just nosed out Jim Cunningham and Corinthian Craig Mense for third, with less than a boat length separating the three. Race 5 was pretty straight forward though the breeze was starting to show signs of going right. Jose Fuentes on Caramba with Luke Lawrence and Ian Coleman aboard led the race start to finish. Steve Benjamin took second with Andrew Cumming finishing third. The wind did continue to swing right and Race 6 went off at a bearing of 050 degrees with a wind speed of 14 knots. After a big surge of boats in the middle of the line led to a General Recall, the PRO switched to a "U" flag. Two boats got caught, including race 5 winner Jose Fuentes. William Douglas on Goombay Smash, a newcomer to the fleet, won the race, leading nearly all the way. He had Chris Larson and Mark Andrews as crew. Finishing second was Jim Cunningham with Michael Goldfarb taking third. The end of day two, and six races (with one drop), saw Peter Duncan in first with 24 points. He was followed by Kevin Grainger with 26 points and Andrew Cumming with 27 points. The Midwinter Championship would come down to the last day. Steve Benjamin in 4th and Lawrie Smith in 6th were set to battle for the series championship. Après racing featured a free keg of Heineken under the sea grape trees, and a delicious Cuban food buffet laid out by Biscayne Bay Yacht Club. Speaking with Peter Duncan back on shore he said, "We had pretty good starts, even on race 4 where we didn't do very well. In that race we had some trouble and made a couple of errors at the top one-half of the course." He continued, "We sailed conservatively, and it was kind of patchy so we just tried to stay in the breeze." Sunday proved to be a bit chillier than the previous days with temperatures in the 60's. Still Chamber of Commerce weather with sunny skies and winds in the 11 knot range. Race 7 got started on time but had to be abandoned when the breeze wouldn't stabilize. The re-start had a bearing of 040 degrees and a velocity of 11 knots. Steve Benjamin was in first wire to wire. The win coupled with a 33 by Lawrie Smith, assured him the win for the 2017-18 Etchells Biscayne Bay Regatta Series, with one race to spare. Michael Goldfarb took second with Jose Fuentes in third. Race 8 was, again, a five leg test. After a "U" flag start, the fleet headed off at a bearing of 040 degrees into a 13 knot breeze. The race was a back and forth between two Peters with Peter Rogers edging out Peter Duncan for the horn. Rogers was sailing his boat Highlife with crew Ian Cooper and Neil Harrison. (Rogers wound up taking a scoring penalty, leaving him with 10 points). Scott Kaufman finished third. Winning the overall Etchells Biscayne Bay Series was Steve Benjamin on the strength of two seconds in the second and third regattas of the series, and a second in the Midwinter Championship. He was followed by Lawrie Smith in second and Peter Duncan in third. Peter Duncan won the Midwinters Regatta and the Schoonmaker Cup while the award for top Corinthian team went to Craig Mense and his crew of John Harford and Fred
