2020 Annual Report
To ICSA Board of Directors**

The initial email call for nominations was emailed March 1, 2020, to all ICSA email lists with a deadline for nominations of April 15. On April 1, a deadline reminder message was sent to all ICSA email lists. On April 13, a last call email was sent. Nominations were closed April 15, 2020.

The following members of the Hall of Fame Committee were confirmed by April 19: NEISA-Skip Whyte; MAISA-Adam Werblow; PCCSC-Brian Stanford; SEISA-Karl Kleinschrodt; NWICSA-Philip Gordon; MCSA-Gail Turluck; and SAISA-David Herbster.

Once the nominations were collected, they were assembled by category and provided to the Committee members with the Award description by category. The Committee members were given five days to consider and send their selections. The Committee had a conference call on April 27, 2020 where the procedures for selection consideration and the goals of having a conference call were discussed and agreed to. All seven Conferences had active participation in the selection process.

The Committee had a discussion about the Campbell Family Lifetime Service Award. There has been a nominee for the last two years who has been solely and incredibly dedicatedly a volunteer; the selectees have been professionals, albeit with extensive volunteer effort as well. There is a thought line that we're now to the point in the development of the sport that coaches are reaching the age requirement for the award (age 60) as it's been since the late 1970s that coaching has developed. Their histories, due to being on the water full time, are far broader than those of non-coaches. Being somewhat divided on if this is the time to consider making this two awards, one professional and one volunteer, the Committee asked me to consult Ann Campbell and Mike Horn on their thoughts about the situation. They saw merit in the point and also are unsure we are quite to the point to add another award. There is concern there would not be a place to install an award at the Naval Academy. Thoughts were started on an alternative method for recognizing the second category. At this time it was decided to not take action on a recommendation but to revisit the matter in 2021.

We had three nominees for Student Leadership (James Rousmaniere Award), two nominees for Lifetime Service (Campbell Family Award), one nominee for Outstanding Service by a College Sailing Professional (Graham Hall Award), and one nominee for Outstanding Service-Volunteer. There were many outstanding nominations. Representatives are reminded that individuals may be renominated.

I thank the nominators and the members of the Committee for their attentive and thoughtful consideration, discovery, and contributions. The Committee is pleased to name the individuals on the following pages as the 2020 inductees to the Inter-Collegiate Sailing Association of North America Hall of Fame.

Recognizing extraordinary leadership and achievement by an undergraduate whose efforts have made a significant contribution to the development, progress, and success of his or her club or team, conference, or the ICSA.

Demonstrated leadership over a period of years, rather than a single year, will receive the most serious consideration. One honoree per year.

It is with great pleasure that I nominate Allison Chenard for the James Rousmaniere Award for Student Leadership. Allison has shown immense leadership and dedication to her work with the ICSA Communications Committee, of which I am a part. I have worked with her since the beginning of 2019 and have witnessed the astounding effort and contributions she has made to the entirety of ICSA Media. During my career, I have only encountered a few individuals who show a dedication to hard work along with a burning passion for the sport. Allison is one of these people. I believe that she has made a significant impact and shown strong leadership on all three levels of college sailing: her own team, her conference, and then on the national level as well.

Allison has served as the Race Team Captain for her four years at the University of Georgia from 2016 to the present. In addition, she was named the Media Chair for her team during her freshman year and has continued the position throughout her college career. Along with managing her team's social media accounts, she has contributed significantly to the development of her team by creating an online learning platform for all members.

In 2016 Allison started the University of Georgia Sailing YouTube channel that is geared towards new members on the team. She created and curated online chalk-talks and videos ranging from skill instruction geared toward new sailors, to highly professional "Open House" videos to bring more awareness to the UGA program and recruit new members for the team. The YouTube channel now boasts 1,400 subscribers worldwide.

Allison's impacts did not stop with her team in Georgia. At the beginning of 2019, she was elected by her peers in the South Atlantic Intercollegiate Sailing Association to be the SAISA Undergraduate Media Representative. In this position, she led a team of media representatives from each school in SAISA to create a better sense of unity within the conference through social media and branding. She also created a district-wide system to collect photos from regattas for easy access, and to house branding folders for each team. In addition, Allison initiated an advertising campaign titled, "This is SAISA," which will be released in 2020.

On the national level, Allison's drive and determination have been tremendous! During the spring of 2019, she was selected as the first ICSA Media Intern (unpaid) and worked on-site for the entirety of the Spring National Championships in Newport, RI. At her own expense, Allison traveled to Newport, found housing, and provided her transportation to the venue each day. While she was on-site at nationals, she managed all of the ICSA social media platforms as well as shuttling content to the other undergraduate conference representatives covering the event from afar. During her time in Newport, she also managed all ICSA sponsor relations and was on call for Livestream adjustments on Facebook. Allison also took a lot of her own photography to supplement the material from the official event photographer. It is easy to overlook the importance of these components when looking at the success of such a large scale event. Allison was highly self-motivated and rarely needed instruction or oversight during nationals. She was instrumental in making sure all of the ICSA media outlets ran smoothly and was integral to professionally presenting the event to the fans of the ICSA.

After the 2019 Spring Nationals, Allison agreed to stay on as the main manager of the ICSA social media accounts and has been working tirelessly throughout the year to create the best possible content for ICSA members and followers. In August 2019, she created a branding package to initiate a cohesive look for the organization across all media platforms, spending many hours creating professional, polished design schemes. She also reached out to

photographers across the country to get events documented. Through each media platform, she made sure to represent all districts and feature a diverse representation of schools, students, and events. She also managed all of the communications involved with the 2019 west coast Singlehanded Nationals from the east coast. She was able to set up an online system to collect material from the host school team-members' phones. She spent many hours throughout the event covering the progress of races and scores since the current coverage for the Singlehanded Nationals has been sparse compared to the Spring events.

Allison did many things that could be considered more "behind the scenes" as well. Throughout this year, she has revamped a lot of the current documents that the ICSA had in place for sponsorship opportunities. She streamlined a "tier" structure and outlined deliverables for each level, which brought more clarity to the sponsorship contract process (for the ICSA and the sponsors themselves). This was something that Allison noticed as a weakness during her internship at nationals, and she wanted to provide clarity for sponsors to understand what they should receive from the ICSA's media coverage.

This winter Allison was eager to be more involved with the leadership in the ICSA. She traveled to Park City on her own expense and presented a media report on behalf of the Communications Committee during the ICSA Winter Meeting in Utah. Most recently, Allison has organized a project in coordination with US Sailing to recognize all the seniors whose seasons were cut short by COVID-19.

During the last two years, Allison has contributed above and beyond to the ICSA, in addition to her conference and team. She is the sole reason the ICSA social media now has a professional and credible online presence. As her overseer in the Communications Committee, she is continually approaching me with creative ideas, concepts, and projects. Allison is not afraid to voice her vision and then follow through.

During my time working with Allison, her love of the sport of sailing has shown through in so many aspects. She has presented and approached every project with ingenuity and vigor. She has been able to affect change and create a well-structured system for social media through her skilled leadership, all while maintaining her authentic love and passion for the sport. Allison has devoted so much of her skill and creativity to the ICSA. She has been an outstanding example for anyone who wants to make an idea a reality, and it is because of this that I nominate Allison for the James Rousmaniere Award for Student Leadership.

CAMPBELL FAMILY AWARD FOR LIFETIME SERVICE

Recognizing a career of extraordinary service to College Sailing, whether as volunteer or professional; one honoree per year; nominees must have passed their 60th birthday.

Pat Healy's career of extraordinary service to College Sailing, as a volunteer and professional Coach, Judge and Umpire, can be described in six major phases to date. Details of his contributions in each phase are in the following paragraphs further below. Recognizing that some of these phases overlap, Pat has made major contributions to College Sailing for over 30 total years since his time as an undergraduate College Sailor. Additionally, he spent decades in the international sailing arena gaining experience and expertise that he brought back to U.S. College Sailing.

- 1967-1971: as a College Sailor, Team Captain, and MCSA volunteer
- 1976-1981: United States Naval Academy - Assistant Dinghy Coach, Head Dinghy Coach, then Head Coach. Also, U.S. Sailing Team Finn Coach in this phase.
- 1996-2017: ISSA - District Coaching Clinics and Judge - improving the pipeline into College Sailing
- 1998-2003: United States Naval Academy - Head Dinghy Coach
- 2006-2019: ICSA Protest Committee Judge and Team Racing Umpire
- 1981-2012 (cyclical)- International Experience

During his 30 years of extraordinary service to College Sailing, Pat Healy has had a profound impact on the lives of countless College Sailors.

- Fundamentally, he instilled the values in student-athletes of training hard and enduring hardship to overcome the physical and mental challenges required to succeed at the highest levels of sailing competition.
- He used his deep expertise in, and life-long passion for, meteorology and competitive sailing to teach competitors that the requisite span of skills and knowledge for racing success included a fusion of tactics, strategy, racing rules, boat handling, seamanship, wind and weather.
- Beyond sailing, in his roles as a Coach, Judge and Umpire, Pat taught life lessons to decades of College Sailors. These life lessons included moral character, leadership, responsibility, accountability mutual support and respect.
- Because the student-athletes he coached at United States Naval Academy also serve our Nation in the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps after graduation, Pat's life lessons have had an immeasurable multiplicative effect as his Navy Sailing charges have further 'paid it forward' to their colleagues in ship and submarine wardrooms, aviation squadron ready rooms and infantry squads around the world.
- In many ways due to the life lessons he taught them, six of Pat's student-athletes from his first stint coaching the United States Naval Academy Dinghy Team have reached the rank of Admiral, a pinnacle in the U.S. Navy. They all benefitted, each in their own way, from their experiences in Navy Sailing, building key foundational skills directly applicable to their professional maritime duties - and excelled as a result. They are Bob Girrier, Dixon Smittr, Ron Horton, Peggy Klein, Tim McGee and Gar Wright.
- There will undoubtedly be more Admirals from his second stint, however they are currently too junior to be eligible to be Flag Officers. Numerous others of Pat's mentees have served distinguished full careers of over twenty years in the Navy and Marine Corps.
- Pat also inspired, encouraged and supported multiple College Sailors to advance to the U.S., international and Olympic levels of competitive sailing, some while they simultaneously served as Naval Officers. Amongst his United States Naval Academy mentees, for example, Doug Hart was second in the U.S. Olympic Trials in 1984 and Gerard Coleman was second in the U.S. Olympic Trials in 1988.

- In his 23 years as an ISSA and ICSA Judge and Umpire, Pat 'paid it forward' himself with a multiplicative impact on College Sailing by sharing his passion and internationally gained rules expertise with a countless number of fellow Judges and Umpires.
